PASTOR JERRY'S MESSAGE



⁶ Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? ⁷ Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? ⁸ Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard.

Isaiah 58:6-8

Greetings my friends!

I can hardly believe that I am sitting here preparing a newsletter article for the month of March! January and February of 2020 have certainly found the people of the United Proclamation of the Gospel busy as together we have been witnessing God's glory all around us and together, we have sharing the abundant gifts God has shared with us. But alas, March is upon us, and now we prepare to observe Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent.

In many of our lives, Lent has traditionally been a time of self-reflection. A time when we "look in the mirror" and ask ourselves whether we are living the kind of lives God calls us to live. Lent is always a time when we talk about spiritual disciplines; increased prayer life, studying the Word of God, and fasting quickly come to mind as some appropriate and valid disciplines during the season. However, at a recent worship celebration the above text from Isaiah really struck me.

In the ancient world, "fasting" was not simply viewed as an individual act of piety but was instituted by a community. A community that desired that all people followed a certain way of living in order that there would be a "shared" journey, a "shared" common experience, a "shared" time of acting as one. Take note of the words of the prophet "Is not this the fast that I (God) choose; to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?"

For the prophet speaking on behalf of God, instead of traditional

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“fasting”, “the fast that God chooses for God’s children is truly a whole new way of life. “Fasting no longer accentuates a day or a specific time, but rather is a whole new way of life. Fasting brings forth a new set of relationships within your current life. The “fasting” that God finds pleasing is a daily fast from domination, blaming others, using evil speech, entitlement and blindness to your own privilege. The “fast” God desires is a call for vigilance in justice and generosity day by day for your fellow human beings.

During our joint worship celebration on January 26, 2020, I asked you all to share with me “If you were creating a new community of faith, what is one characteristic you would like to see.” Your responses to this question touched my heart and demonstrated a wonderful spiritual maturity. Here a few of those thoughts which dominated your responses: Love of God and neighbor, being welcoming and inviting to all people, unity, forgiveness, hoping for a greater good, respecting all people both inside the community and outside our doors.

Isaiah shares that If God’s people choose the “fast” that God desires that they will have the very blessing that they seek: light, healing, and the presence and guidance of God among them. Isaiah shares that people, individually and corporately, cannot have a full relationship with God without being in a righteous relationship with one another. Our piety toward God cannot be disconnected from the everyday life we lead. When these righteous relationships are truly pursued, and practiced God presence is revealed amid the people.

As the pastor of the United Proclamation of the Gospel I am therefore calling on our community of faith to truly enter a time of “fasting” during the season of Lent 2020. Together, let us “fast” from domination, blaming others, using evil speech, entitlement and blindness to your own privilege. Together let us place the practices which we desire and which we confess are righteous become the patterns by which we live. Together, let us bear

witness to how God’s presence is being revealed amid God’s people.

Each week in our worship celebrations an insert will be placed inside your bulletins with a specific area to “fast” from in the coming week. I am hoping that during the week, each of us will practice this particular “fast” and then write our observations on the insert and bring that insert back to worship the following week and place them in the baskets by the entrance to our worship space.

Dear members of the UPG,

What would it be like to walk miles to retrieve water and carry it back to your village day after day? You could not attend school or even hold a job with such a difficult chore. If you lived in an under developed country like Uganda or Zimbabwe, that is how you would live.

I have a very important project to share with all of you that will take place during Lent. Knowing that clean water has life-giving, life-sustaining properties and many places in our world have little safe access to it, the God's Work. Our Hands Team is promoting the collection of funds to purchase a water well through the ELCA Good Gifts program affiliated with ELCA World Hunger.

When we drink a glass of water that flows right into our homes or take a long hot shower, we may not realize that many people in other countries do not have this luxury. Through the ELCA,

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we are told that four months out of the year during times of drought, individuals in Uganda, often children, walk incredible distances – sometimes more than six miles – to obtain water. This outlay of time and energy prevents children from attending school and adults from making a living; the economy suffers creating a cycle of poverty that never ends. A simple water well can bring change and hope to these people.

Eighty percent of the people in Zimbabwe have no access to clean water and no adequate sanitation. Waterborne diseases like cholera, dysentery, and typhoid (that have long disappeared from America), are the leading causes of death for the people of Zimbabwe. With gifts to ELCA Good Gifts, a system of drilling boreholes has provided clean water centrally located within the community. Not only has sanitation and health been greatly improved, students who no longer need to walk two miles one way to retrieve water, can attend school. This fresh water makes irrigation possible. Selling crops improves the economy. Safe, clean water is life changing and hope giving.

The next time you drink clean water that flows right into your homes, thank God for that blessing and remember that this is not the case for many families in other places. Providing access to clean water is an extremely powerful way to create change; gifts to the ELCA through the Good Gifts program provides villages in the countries of Africa with clean water through a variety of types of wells. Our goal is to provide a simple water well at a cost of \$2500.

As part of your Lenten discipline, please give generously to the "Water Well Project" to help others less fortunate than we. We are blessed to be a blessing and, through the ELCA Good Gifts program, we can be just that. Matching funds in the amount of \$1500 have been generously offered by a UPG member to help us reach our goal. Thank you for your support.

Dear friends,

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THANKS TO ALL BLANKET MAKERS



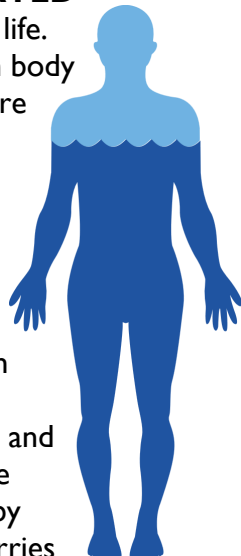

THE IMPORTANCE OF STAYING HYDRATED

Water is a main building block of life. Approximately 60% of the human body is water. The brain and muscles are 75% water. Blood is 92% water. Bones are 22% water. Without water very little can survive: not plants, not animals, not fish, not humans.



Our bodies use water to: moisten ALL of our tissues, regulate temperature, protect our organs, and lubricate joints. Water lessens the burden on our kidneys and liver by flushing out waste products. It carries nutrients and oxygen to all of our cells. Water is needed to create saliva & to aid in digestion. It is

what dissolves nutrients from the food we eat and delivers those nutrients to the rest of our body. And water aids our brain in functioning normally.

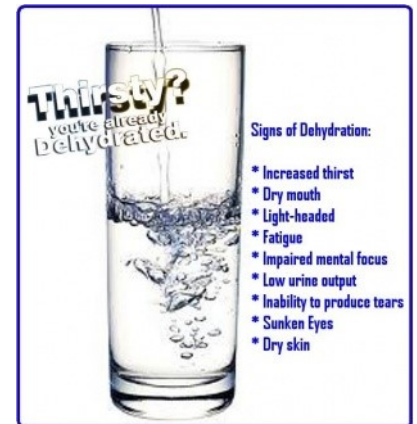
Every cell in our body is filled with, and surrounded by water. It is estimated that the average human body contains 37.2 trillion cells. That's a lot of water!



Beginning at approximately 20 years of age our cells begin to lose the ability to maintain the water levels they once did. Our skin isn't baby bottom soft anymore. It begins to take longer for cuts and bruises to heal. The rate of change, year after year, is slight enough to be imperceptible to us. But happen they do.

Unbeknownst to us, our body is very much in tune with the amount of water in our system. It is, therefore, also very in tune with a lack of water. A lack of water, dehydration, will cause our body to make adjustments in an attempt to compensate. Early signs of dehydration include: dry mouth, thirst, darker urine, & a decrease in the amount of urine we produce. As dehydration becomes more pronounced skin becomes dry, headache and dizziness occurs, and confusion may set in. Blood pressure will drop and our heart will beat faster; all this as our body attempts to continue to function.

Things that can cause dehydration include: illness, fever, hot summer weather, sweating, the dry, heated indoor air of winter, & not drinking enough fluids each & every day.



Signs of Dehydration:

- * Increased thirst
- * Dry mouth
- * Light-headed
- * Fatigue
- * Impaired mental focus
- * Low urine output
- * Inability to produce tears
- * Sunken Eyes
- * Dry skin

Our body loves water; feed it!
